



Historical discovery hunt

Following the Papineau family footsteps

Approximate time and distance: 1 hour and 2 km

Participate in a discovery hunt that marks National Patriots' Day, which takes place the Monday before May 25 each year. This day aims to highlight the importance of the Patriots' battle of 1837-1838 in the history of our country. Louis-Joseph Papineau was the leader of the Patriote Party as early of 1815 and the seigneur of the Petite-Nation. This hunt will allow you to learn more about the history of Lord Papineau and his descendants while touring the village of Montebello.

📍 Let's go! Meet in the middle of the village, at the place where you can see a large metal symbol related to time, with a bust over it.

Question 1: What is the name of the first seigneur of the Petite-Nation, father of Louis-Joseph Papineau?

📍 Go to the place where wood oven pizza reigns.

Question 2: This place was built in 1840, while Louis-Joseph Papineau was in exile in France. Name three other businesses that have appeared in this place since then:

📍 Go between the acupuncturist and the village potter, in front of this large parking lot where the town hall and the first Montebello newspaper were once located. This newspaper, *L'Interprète*, was founded by Henri Bourassa, founder of *Le Devoir* and grandson of Louis-Joseph Papineau.

Question 3: Who are the 3 families who were blacksmiths at the same time in the village of Montebello in the 20th century?

📍 Go to the place where the mayor, the town council and art are based.

Question 4: What is the name of the grandson of Louis-Joseph Papineau, a great orator like his grandfather, who was mayor of Montebello at the age of 21?

📍 Go to the building built in 1920, which used to be a housekeeping school. This building stands between a wool store and a restaurant built of logs

Question 5: Who were the first inhabitants of this place? _____

Question 6: what are the dates of construction of the 1st and the 4th convent?

📍 Go to the place where you can have a sweet treat and learn about the tourist attractions of the region.

Question 7: In 1877, Amédée Papineau, Louis-Joseph's eldest son, was among the first passengers to use this means of transportation to Montebello. In what year did the building, which allowed the use of this means of transportation, undergo its own journey?

📍 Stroll along the path that will take you into the heart of the forest, where most of the members of the Papineau family were laid to rest.

Question 8: In what years was this building built? _____

Question 9: What painful grief inspired the construction of this gothic-rustic mausoleum?

📍 Return to the village by the seigneurial lane to find this house at the entrance of the forest, in front of an Italian restaurant with red awnings, next to the large open gates that once allowed the Papineau family to access the manor by carriage.

Question 10: who lived in this house? _____

Question 11: What other work did the family members have to do?

📍 Go to the religious heritage site in the heart of the village.

Question 12: What is the name of the architect and artist, son-in-law of Louis Joseph, who drew the plans and supervised the construction of this place? This man is also the husband of Azélie Papineau and the father of Henri Bourassa.
